#### Aims of Module

To develop advanced skills and knowledge necessary, to critically reflect and develop work within a specialised applied practice context. To develop high levels of independent visual research and theoretical inquiry, within students area of contemporary art or design practice. Students will be encouraged to explore, experiment and test new ideas that extends their specialist discipline knowledge, its contemporary practice and creative contexts. Students will be encouraged to develop original ideas, creative thinking and independence of thought, to be self-motivated and able to bring intellectual modes of critical applied practice and inquiry to their specialised applied practice.

## **Learning Outcomes for Module**

On completion of this module, students are expected to be able to:

- Demonstrate the ability to devise independent strategy[s] to select, critically compare and evaluate relevant theory and practice: visual, factual or contextual in nature, which supports your individual project work and its continued professional development.
- Demonstrate originality in the development of advanced practice based strategies and/or theoretical reflective skills, drawing on appropriate professional tools and approaches for the development of an advanced independent art or design project.
- Demonstrated a deep understanding of relevant subject specific practitioners or practices and contexts:
- 3 within contemporary or emerging fields, which support advanced levels of enquiry and development within your specialist art design practice.
- Demonstrate development of appropriate creative practice[s] within a specialist area of applied studio and/or professional practice; providing evidence of effective planning, self-reflection, self-evaluation and transferable professional skills, which can be evaluated against their personal project plan and ambitions.
- Evidence and demonstrate advanced range of skills and methods for academic research, including information technology in support or your understanding of critical discourses informing contemporary practice.

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### **Indicative Module Content**

Building on established applied practices within a given specialism in Art and Design, this module is designed to support students in re-evaluating, experimenting and testing new ideas within their area of applied practice. In this module students will identify and propose a specific research project having undertaken an analytical and critical reappraisal of their creative practice to date. Students will be supported by an appropriate range of teaching methods and specialist academic studio, research and technical staff, through individual and group tutorials, workshops and seminars; towards developing a personal practice and methodology within their specialist applied practice area. This applied practice module further aims to support and encourage students in establishing greater depth and critical understanding of their specialist area of practice: towards establishing a clear basis for a professional level of applied practice and engagement; informed by appropriate research, production and dissemination methods. All students are encouraged to expand their practice and methodology through self-directed investigation, experimentation with a variety of creative processes and technical skills within a clearly framed research question. This module offers access to specialist teaching, professional mentoring, workshop provision and technical support in the development of students' negotiated applied practice or external project work.

# **Module Delivery**

The emphasis of this module is on individualized models of study and self-directed critical reflective practice, with the majority of time allocated to self-initiated and self-directed project work, which is supported within a negotiated studio environment or equivalent. Staff and Students identify the most appropriate academic and practice-based strategies in the development of their work via project proposal. This module is delivered and facilitated by means of studio based crits, tutorials (peer or individual), access to specialist workshop provision and external partnerships as appropriate.
