To examine and evaluate the practical application of international law and its response to contemporary international issues.

### **Indicative Module Content**

Examination of the history, development and nature of the international legal system; the sources of international law; international personality; the rights and duties of states; the emergence of international organisations; and the position of the individual on the international stage.

This is a lecture and seminar based module. Lectures provide core module content. Seminars develop associated higher level skills through student centred learning.
