Aims of Module

To provide the student with a working knowledge and understanding of the law of evidence in Scotland, with the ability to apply the rules to practical situations.

Learning Outcomes for Module

On completion of this module, students are expected to be able to:

- 1 Evaluate the sufficiency of evidence in law.
- 2 Explain and apply the rules of relevancy and admissibility of evidence.
- 3 Critically discuss to what extent stricter evidential standards are applied to criminal cases than to civil cases.
- 4 Determine the competence, compellability and privileges of witnesses.

Indicative Module Content

This module will cover the main aspects of evidence in both civil and criminal cases namely: relevance of evidence; the burden of proof; sufficiency of evidence; judicial knowledge; admissibility of evidence; competence and compellability of witnesses; privileges of witnesses and communications; disclosure and recovery of evidence, and forms of proof and appeals.

Module Delivery

The primary mode of delivery will be lectures, with tutorials acting as a forum for the development of higher cognitive skills through using case studies and problem-solving techniques.
